Henry G. Goble, born about 1863 in Millsburg, Orange County, New York to Elizabeth (Jane?) Goble was arrested for manslaughter in the second degree and sentenced on June 1, 1900 to 8 to 10 years. When he was arrested, he was living at 17 Benjamin Street, Middletown, New York with his uncle, Coe. S. Goble, brother to Elizabeth. Apparently Elizabeth never married, but had two sons; Dayton and Henry. Henry was married to Addie, there were no children reported.

In the Hornellsville Weekly Tribune on November 17, 1899 the following article appeared.

#### Killed in a Quarrel

Middletown, N.Y., Nov 23.

Henry Goble, 39 years old, of this city was arrested here last night, charged with the killing of John H. Mullen, 60 years old, with whom he had a fight Monday afternoon at Greenville.

Henry's description in the sentencing report indicated that he had quite a few scars, but was otherwise healthy. He was an Irish Protestant and stuttered. He was still in prison in 1905 but was out of prison by 1910 and living in a boarding house in Minisink, Orange County, New York. In 1930 he was working on a dairy farm as a hired hand in Wawayanda, Orange County, New York. He appeared in 1940 at age 78 in Middletown State Homeopathic Hospital in Middletown. New York, a hospital for the treatment of mental disorders.

## **GOBLE INVENTOR**



Dr. E. Marlowe Goble is a world-renowned

surgeon who is a pioneer and inventor in the areas of orthopedic surgery and sports medicine arthroscopy. He founded MedicineLodge, Inc., which was later acquired by Innovative Devices, Inc. He is Associate Clinical Professor, Department of

Orthopedic Surgery, University of Utah; Adjunct Professor/Team Physician, Utah State University; and Orthopedic Surgeon, Alpine Orthopedics. He holds 57 U.S. patents in his field, with more pending.

E. Marlowe Goble, M.D.: Goble, founder and director of research and development at Medicine Lodge, Inc., is also an orthopedic surgeon at Goble Knee Clinic. He started his independent orthopedic surgery practice in Logan, Utah, in 1981. In performing his job as knee surgeon, he conceived and developed a unique set of methods for drilling and securing ligament replacements to bones in joint reconstructive surgery.

Dr. Goble partnered with an engineering friend, who ran a machine shop in town, to develop the initial prototypes of tools and devices. The technology they invented together enhances recovery and full use of injured joints and torn ligaments. These techniques have been successfully applied to one of the most common athletic injuries: an anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) tear in the knee.

Dr. Goble's contribution combined with that of many other surgeon inventors and biomechanical engineers, has enhanced minimally invasive ACL reconstructive surgery, allowing athletes to regain full use of their legs more rapidly and return to full athletic activity.

#### 22 YEARS OF RESEARCH!!

(This year marks the 22nd year of genealogical research into the Goble family by me, Evelyn Goble Steen.)

My interest in the family history, at a young age, was satisfied when I was told that my background was "a little bit of everything," i.e.; English, Irish, Scottish, Welsh, French, German, Polish, Indian, etc. Okay, that was an answer. I accepted it. I never enjoyed history as a child in school. I would select any other class. History was boring - boring, until I became part of it. The discovery of my ancestors put me in the middle of history and gave me a piece of it. If teachers could somehow do that for children, I believe they would love history.

In 1993, when my husband turned 50 and needed to find a part of his roots, I became entranced. We took a short drive from our home in Maryland to Chestnut Level, Pennsylvania. There we found an historic church and cemetery. From there we went Lancaster, and continued our search in land records and old wills. I was amazed that so many of the records of the 1700s were stored in

libraries and available for us to look through. We located records of property once owned by the earliest Steens in America. We actually found the site of the home drawn on old maps, transferred them to modern maps and drove to the area. Sitting where the old house should sit was an old stone, two-story house, with modern additions. Behind it, were the remains of an old stone silo. We questioned, could this be the house? Could it be over 200 years old? Yes!

I found myself "bitten," by the genealogy bug! In the years after that, I have traveled, studied, photographed and searched for everything Goble. I've written letters, letters and more letters. I've phoned and met with many people, discovered many new cousins, all in a relatively short time. I also discovered that not everyone is as interested in this research as I am. I am sure my single-mindedness has dismayed and frustrated my friends and family. I have been so totally consumed that at times I felt I had no other life. There is no way to complete the research. There will always be more to discover.
