

The only picture our family had of Shawna was in March of 1970, she was 3 months old.

For years and years we always wondered what happened to Shawna Lee. Having never heard from her or her mother we pretty much had given up. Then along came the Internet. A couple of years ago, we started tracking down her mom and found a new name to track. It took two years and Face Book to come to the rescue.

On August 28 I sent a message directly to Shawna through her Face Book account. I told her it was not my intent to intrude in her life, but I just wanted her to know she has family that cares about her in California.

Within seconds I heard from her, and then seconds later I got another message. "Oh My Goodness" "Are you my dad's sister?" This all of course was followed by a whole list of questions.

Shawna is married, she has three children, and she lives in Ohio. This past weekend she flew to San Diego to meet me and my mom. . We had a mini reunion with grandma, Aunt Paula and a few cousins. GOBLE FBI AGENT



Theodore Norris Goble, Jr. (of our Thomas Goble Tree) died September 4, 2009, at Brigham and Women's Hospital following a heart attack. He was 84. Ted was an active supporter of the Goble Family Association and provided a great deal of genealogy information on his family line.

What I didn't know about Ted until his death was that he had been an FBI

agent. He had an illustrious career with the FBI. From 1966 to 1970 working on high profile cases such as the Kennedy assassination, the arresting of Ku Klux Klan members during the Civil Rights Movement and he was a counterintelligence contact in Israel working to deport a gangster back to the United States for trial. An article written about him in the Boston Globe said he carried a gun and a shotgun but never fired his weapon in 27 years of working in the FBI.

Theodore Norris (10) Goble Jr. was born Sep 16, 1891 in Newark to Theodore Norris and Emma Robinson (Stephenson) Goble. He and his younger sister, Patricia, grew up in the New Jersey towns of Arlington and Pompton Plains. After he graduated from high school, he enrolled at Brothers College, the theological school of what is now Drew University in Madison, N.J., planning to be a Methodist minister.

Ted joined the Navy to fight in World War II, assigned to the USS Bainbridge in Guam. Returning after the war, he graduated from Drew University in 1947 with a degree in history. That year he also married his high school sweetheart, Cora Harris.

He started Harvard Law School in 1947 and graduated three years later, passed the bar in New Jersey, and practiced law for a while. He started with the FBI in 1952 in Charlotte, N.C., and after two years was assigned to its New York office. The FBI sent him to Georgetown University to study Hebrew, preparing him for Tel Aviv, and assigned him to the bureau's Washington, D.C. field office. In 1972 he was transferred to New England.

Ted and Cora had seven children: Charles Jeffery, Kevin Harris, Theodore Norris, Nancy, Amy, Sarah and Quentin. They divorced in 1988 and Cora died in 2001.

After retiring from the FBI Ted worked in New Hampshire as a private investigator. He and his second wife, Shirley Mulford, a United Church of Christ minister, lived in Cambridge, Massachusetts. In Cambridge, Ted was an active member of First Church in Cambridge, Congregational, serving on its board of senior deacons, cochairing its capital campaigns, and assuming other leadership roles. He tutored immigrants in English, and supported human rights, civil rights, and gay rights. Ted and Shirley had one daughter, Emma. He leaves 15 grandchildren.

I spoke to Ted on the phone and he sent many records for our files and he never mentioned his amazing career! Evelyn

OBITUARIES



Dr. John Corban Goble³ died **November 7, 2009** in a helicopter accident prior to a Veteran's Day Air Show in southern California. He was 58.

Born in Pittsburg to G.C. and Mildred (Matheny) Goble on July 17, 1951, John attended Pittsburg schools and graduated from PHS in 1969. From there his education included the U.S.

Naval Academy, Penn State University, Johns Hopkins University, and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute whereby he was awarded his Bachelors, two Masters Degrees and his Doctorate.

John was President and CEO of Sectra North America, a worldwide medical service company specializing in the detection and prevention of disease using medical imaging techniques. A Vietnam veteran, John previously held key positions at the National Institutes of Health, Albany Medical Center, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, the University of Virginia and Hewlett Packard.

While at Hewlett Packard, John co-patented a breakthrough imaging technique that eliminated the need for exploratory surgery. He has six medical patents and published over 20 research papers in his field. His work has been featured in National Geographic and exhibited at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C.

John was an accomplished pilot and held both commercial and instrument rated pilot licenses. He was an expert marksman and enjoyed raising Springer Spaniels. Flying, however, was his passion.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 26 years, Colleen (Gradwell) Goble of Easton, CT and his mother Mildred of Pittsburg. Also surviving are two brothers Jim, of Knoxville, TN and Jeff, of Mission Hills, KS. John had five nephews and a niece who all adored him: Grayson, Grant, Gretchen, Corban, Clark and Andrew. He was preceded in death by his father G.C. "Corb" Goble in 1969. Corb was principal of Lincoln School in Pittsburg for 19 years.
